- 1. domestic politics and international economics
- 2. political instability
- 3. resentment of U.S. restrictions on use of aid funds
- 4. death of JFK in 1963
- 5. disenchantment in U.S. with foreign aid programs
- 6. diversion of attention and resources to Vietnam War

Dominican Intervention

I. "Progress and justice do not flourish at the point of a gun." LBJ

- 1. Lyndon Johnson focus on Great Society
- 2. Alliance for Progress conventional aid program
- 3. avoid "second Cuba"
- 4. assassination of Rafael Trujillo in 1961 instability
- 5. civilian reformer Juan Bosch
- 6. April 1965: rescue operation \rightarrow peacekeeping mission
- 7. wear down and isolate pro-Bosch forces
- 8. Inter-American Peace Force
- 9. intervention denounced throughout Latin America


The U.S. invaded and occupied the Dominican Republic in 1965.

1. guerrilla movements <—> military

a. revolutionary fervor

b. tyrannical governments sparked armed opposition

2. climax of struggle in 1960s

3. changing role for armed forces in Cold War

4. dedication to domestic order - internal threats to security

5. new military doctrine

a. U.S. training programs - School of the Americas

b. inter-American military brotherhood

c. enemies: rural or urban-based Marxist insurgencies

- d. removal of civilian leaders who threatened stability
- e. armed services could run countries more efficiently

3) dedication to national well-being






Panama Canal Returned in December 1999







4. massive aid to support U.S. interests in Nicaragua and El Salvador


Reagan Doctrine and Iran-Contra

Plot Thickens

- 1. landslide reelection for Reagan in 1984
- 2. Reagan Doctrine: U.S. support for anti-Soviet insurgents
- 3. miscalculations of Daniel Ortega
- 4. military aid to Contras restored in June 1986
- 5. NSC, Robert McFarlane, and Lt. Colonel Oliver North
- 6. arms, hostages, and money for the Contras
- 7. role of retired Air Force General Richard Secord
- 8. affair unravels in October 1986 plane shot down
- 9. congressional investigation and fallout blow to Reagan's credibility and prestige













Covid 19 and Latin America

Latin America faces worst economic legacy of coronavirus pandemic


Forecast change in GDP from pre-pandemic level to end-2021 (%)




